Steering Committee Members

Benjamin Wolthers

Benjamin Wolthers is an associate lawyer at McMath Law in Fredericton. He has a diverse practice with a strong property component. He has worked with the Resource Conservation sector in Parks Canada from 2010-2013. This position primarily focused on protecting endangered species of flora and fauna from anthropogenic impacts. Specific responsibilities ranged from conducting fish community surveys to invasive species management. He has also volunteered with a number of NGO's across the Maritimes and in Switzerland to ensure protection of species-at-risk.
