HOW AND WHEN TO SOW

Start indoors under grow lights or sunny window

When: mid-March to early April What: Basil, Parsley, Thyme, Leek

Direct sow outdoors

Early to Mid-May	Mid-late May	Early June	Mid-late August

PLANTS WELL SUITED TO SMALL SPACES

High yields in small spaces:

Spinach

- likes cooler weather
- plant thick then thin to 10cm apart to discourage bolting
- plant around other plants and *pull by July* when the spinach will bolt making room for other plant to grow

Leaf lettuce

cut often to prevent bolting or have 2 different rows that you replant on rotation every 2 weeks

Swiss chard

- interplant with other crops
- will grow all season if you cut it every few weeks

Dwarf snap peas

- grow well on a 3 foot high mesh fence
- pick pods while they are flat and they are edible
- pick often to encourage plant to keep producing but if peas form they are good to eat as well

Bush beans

• will produce a large crop if you pick them every few days so they don't mature.

<u>Basil</u>

- pick out flowering head in center of plant when it forms to keep plant growing
- harvest through out the season by pulling off individual leaves

Beet

- seed thick then thin plants to 2cm apart when they are 5-6 cm tall; eat in your salad
- Thin again when plants are 15cm tall and small beets have formed. Cook and eat greens and beets
- Continue to use as the beet grow through out the growing season so you will have some large mature beet by October to roast or pickle

Parsley

- grows well into fall
- can be harvest by picking off up to half the stems once the plant has ten or more branches

PLANTS LESS SUITED TO OUR SOIL TYPE AND SMALL SPACES

You many only want to grow only one or two any of theses types of plants as they:

- are hard to grow because they have many pests
- are disease prone
- are heavy feeders requiring specific weather conditions
- are large plants that need lots of space
- need to be staked or pruned often

Tomatoes

- fragile and need protection from cold and pests when transplanted
- growing a cherry type heritage variety will offer best yield over a long time
- bush types tend to be smaller plants
- mulch with an organic mulch to help make them more drought tolerant
- heaver feeder so they require rich soil with lots of well rotted compost to start and extra compost or compost tea every few week until fruit forms

Cucumbers

- fragile and need protection from pests when transplanted
- heavy feeders requiring rich soil with lots of compost
- prone to disease in wet weather
- need lot of space to spread or support to grow up

Potatoes

- cheap to buy and require lots of space to grow
- very prone to pests and disease

<u>Turnip</u>

- prone to wire worm and club root
- requires lots of space to grow
- kohlrabi is a better choice needing less space and protection only from cutworms when young
